Blue Ribbon Patriotism

"Blue Ribbon Patriotism How the Pennsylvania Farm Show Helped the World War II Effort" is about to be launched with a 1940s party featuring big band era music, 1940s dance demonstrations and lessons, snacks of the 1940s and more.

The book, sponsored by the Friends of the Pennsylvania Farm Show Foundation, Inc., will be introduced at the party from 2 to 4 p.m. Thursday, November 10th in the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex.

"Blue Ribbon Patriotism" was written by Pennsylvania Farm Show historian Mary Klaus, author of "Hold Your Horses! The Pennsylvania Farm Show at 100," to describe what Klaus calls "one of the Farm Show's best kept secrets."

In 1942-43, the Farm Show Complex housed the Pennsylvania State School of Aeronautics where hundreds of people (mostly young adults and many teen-agers) learned how to repair airplane engines from planes that had been shot up in World War II. After the school closed, the Farm Show Complex then housed the Army Air Corps engine repair department, where damaged aircraft engines were repaired. After the repairs, the engines were sent to the Middletown Air Depot to be put in airplanes, tested and sent back to the war.

The party will include introduction of special guests helpful in the research for this book; a short talk by the author about the Farm Show's huge contributions to the war efforts; a short talk by

Janice Shuty Morgenstern, research assistant for this project, about life in the 1940s; a toast to the Greatest Generation and sale of the book and book signing by the author. The party will include displays of World War II era memorabilia, dance demonstrations and lessons and a special appearance by "Rosie the Riveter."



- Include all licensed screen and printer fonts in a folder labeled "FONTS". All fonts must be PostScript Type I fonts.

- Include all necessary files
- All graphics should be saved as TIFF or EPS files.
- Resolution should be 300 DPI maximum.
