



The 1940s Came to Life at the Farm Show Complex Book Launching



The Friends of The Pennsylvania Farm Show Foundation Inc. recently launched the Farm Show historian's latest book with a party featuring everything from Big Band music to bread pudding and from dancing to discussions about life in the 1940s.

"Blue Ribbon Patriotism How the Pennsylvania Farm Show Helped the World War II Effort" by Pennsylvania Farm Show Historian Mary Klaus was launched at a Veteran's Day eve party with 65 quests.

Klaus and Janice Morgenstern Shuty, her research assistant, spent most of 2022 researching the years that the then U.S. War Department used the Farm Show Complex for the World War II effort.

In 1942-43, the Farm Show Complex housed the Pennsylvania State School of Aeronautics, where hundreds of civilians learned how to repair airplane engines from planes that had been shot up in World War II. The book includes a chapter with memories of a 99-year-old Cambria County "Rosie the Riveter" who recalled her experiences going to that school and another chapter about a then Cumberland County high school senior called to the principal's office and invited to go to the aeronautics school.

After the school closed, the Farm Show Complex housed the Army Air Corps engine repair department, where the damaged aircraft engines were repaired. The repaired engines were sent to the Middletown Air Depot to be put in airplanes, tested, and sent back to war.

When World War II ended, the military spent months restoring the Farm Show Complex for agricultural use. The "real" Farm Show returned in 1947.



Dance Instructor Linda Galinac; her husband, George; their son, Scott; and Dauphin County Commissioner George P. Hartwick III demonstrated dances of the era. The books are being sold at the Farm Show for \$10 each, with free books for World War II veterans and half-price for military veterans with identification. Klaus, the author of "Hold Your Horses! The Pennsylvania Farm Show at 100," will talk about the war years at the Farm Show and sign books at the 107th Pennsylvania Farm Show in January.
