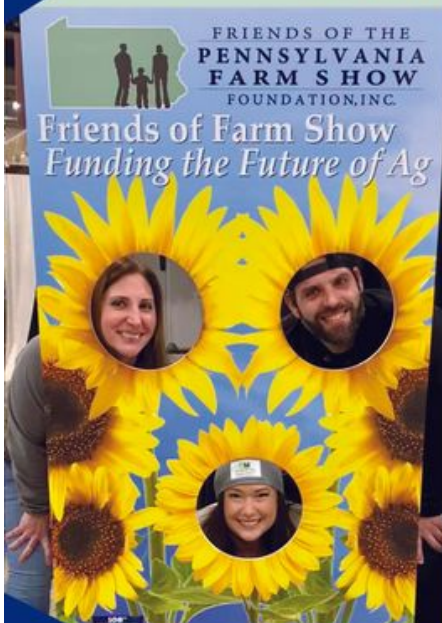

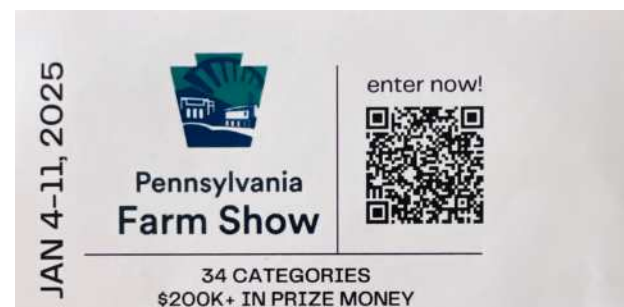

DAIRY HALL OF FAME AWARD

This award was developed to recognize Pennsylvania dairy leaders' outstanding service and accomplishments. Selection is based on character, leadership, and youth development in the dairy industry.

2024 Recipient: Lolly Leshner

All American Dairy Show. As fundraising coordinator, she solicited sponsors from industry, farms, and the state legislature to continually support the show and all of its activities. She oversaw the Youth Benefit Auction, edited the Premium Book, created promotional media, coordinated the volunteers, and helped organize the show's 50th anniversary in 2013.

Today, Lolly is a partner-owner of Way-Har Farms LLC. She and William operate a 300 cow dairy with 400 acres of crops. The milk produced at the farm is bottled and sold directly to consumers at their retail store, Way-Har Farm Market. Lolly manages milk marketing, wholesale customers, and specialty events for their homemade ice cream. She and William have mentored numerous upcoming dairymen through college internships at the farm and store. Between running a dairy farm and a retail market and raising four children, Joshua, Jaylene, Laura, and Olivia. Lolly advocates for fellow dairy farmers.

Lolly has lobbied for fair milk pricing and regulations to the House Agriculture Committee, served on the Corporate Resolutions Committee for Dairy Farmers of America, and was a founding pioneer of the Pennsylvania Center for Dairy Excellence. Lolly also volunteers locally on the school board for Hamburg School District, Kutztown Fair Board, Berks Agricultural Resource Network, and the Greater Berks Food Bank.

Lolly is a leader in dairy promotion on the state and national levels. She has been a member of the Pennsylvania Dairy Promotion Program board of directors for over 20 years. She also serves as First Vice President of American Dairy Association North East Board of Directors. She represents the northeast region nationally as Secretary of the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board and is a member of Dairy Management Inc.'s board of directors. She is a member of the DMI Personnel Committee and the Fluid Milk Advisory Committee.

Lolly is a leader in dairy promotion and a public advocate for dairy, helping inform consumers about modern dairy farming. She has conducted many media interviews and public speaking appearances to help others understand how farmers sustainably produce safe, nutritious food and care for their animals and the environment. Every January, Lolly eagerly sells cheese cubes, exhibits Jersey heifers, and visits with the public during her favorite event of the year – the Pennsylvania Farm Show.

Her reliability is above and beyond whether Lolly is escorting the combine during harvest, relief feeding calves at the farm, or driving a carload of 4-H'ers to a judging contest. Three of her greatest accolades have been selected as Outstanding Young Dairy Leaders Institute alumni, named "The Pace Setter" by the Center for Dairy Excellence. She was voted the first female chair of the Pennsylvania Dairy Promotion Program board of Directors.

Lolly had been rooted in small-family farming since childhood. She was raised on a fruit farm with cows, pigs, and chickens in the mountains of Huntingdon County. She found her path into the dairy industry during her college career at Penn State.

Lolly graduated in 1986 with a degree in Agricultural Economics and Rural Sociology. She was heavily involved with the Dairy Science Club and Block and Bridle Club. Later, she went on to charter the Armsby Society, serve on the Penn State Ag Alumni Board of Directors and Dairymen's Club Board, and become the Stockmen's Club president. Most importantly, Lolly met her husband, William Leshner, at Penn State. While joining William in his family farm business, Way-Har Farms in Berks County, Lolly worked a variety of jobs in the industry. She was a Farm Credit credit analyst, the Pennsylvania Dairy Promotion Program Director, and the Milk Procurement Director for Dietrich's Milk Products.

In 1991, Lolly began her 25-year trek as the Fundraising Coordinator for the

The PA FFA State Officers have begun their conferences for the year! The first one that was held was Fall Leadership Conference. At this conference first-year members learn about opportunities in FFA, connecting with members and growing as students.





This National Teach Ag Day Career Immersion Event serves as a learning laboratory for our Agricultural & Extension Education (AEE) undergraduate students while exposing secondary School-Based Agricultural Education (SBAE) high school students to careers and research topics in agriculture. This fall career immersion event was held in conjunction with National Teach Ag Day on Thursday September 19, 2024, and included secondary SBAE students visiting the Russell E Larson Agricultural Research Center for a full day educational event focused on agricultural science and research. College of Agricultural Sciences (CoAS) senior AEE undergraduate students played a prominent role in the logistics and management of the event to gain a front row seat to develop similar opportunities for their own students. Through this program, our AEE students are learning and experiencing methods in which they can connect their future pupils to careers in agriculture.

Recruiting young people into the agriculture workforce is a priority for current industry leaders, and universities and SBAE teachers. Through this learning event we are not only providing pre-service SBAE teachers with firsthand experience, but also providing our external partners and stakeholders with an opportunity to recruit and interact with the future agriculture workforce and engaging future teachers to think about how to create experiences for their own students.



Visiting the Russell E Larson Agricultural Research Center included a farm tour to see operations at the Agronomy Farm, Horticulture Farm, Entomology Farm, and Plant Pathology Farm.

During this full-day field trip experience, participants (high school students and their teachers) rotated through five stations to learn about various careers within the agriculture industry: workshops with researcher teams, a research farm tour, and a hands-on tractor-driving station hosted by industry partners. Lunch included an opportunity to visit with representatives of several Penn State agricultural majors at a career expo.

- Number of participants: There were eight schools, ninety-five participants, and twelve teachers/chaperones.

Presenters included researchers, graduate students and pre-service ag educators, who will be teaching in classroom next year.

The full 2024 debrief is in process, and the 2025 event timeline plan will be available by November.

Initial findings:

- Initial responses from the event survey were very positive
- Positively received, much interest in 2025 event; plan to increase capacity and extend reach
- Broaden the scope of CoAS departments and types of engagement; include more hands-on and interactive activities (i.e., ag mechanics engine assembly or food science taste test)

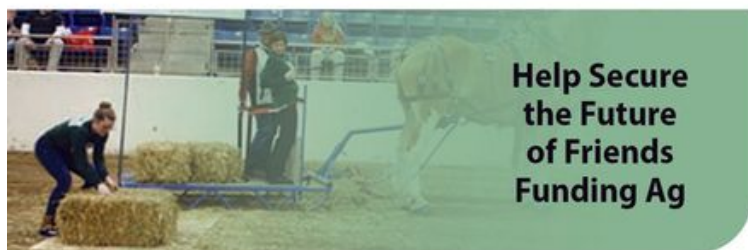
What is a Feed Scurry?

AG EDUCATORS IN PENNSYLVANIA AND BEYOND RECEIVE BACK-TO-SCHOOL BOXES FROM DAIRY LEADERS OF TOMORROW AND INDUSTRY SPONSORS

More Than 250 Back-to-School Boxes Were Sent To Ag Educators With Personal Messages



Harrisburg, Pa. – Thanks to support from industry sponsors and individual donors, the Dairy Leaders of Tomorrow (DLT) program sent more than 250 back-to-school boxes to agriculture educators this August.

The boxes were part of an initiative to share positivity, encouragement and support to agriculture educators in Pennsylvania and beyond at the start of the school year. The DLT Program is managed by the Dairy Excellence Foundation to help prepare high school students to work in the dairy industry through industry-recognized courses, scholarship opportunities, and on-farm experiences.

“Agriculture teachers are laying the foundation for the next generation to learn about the role farmers have in our communities. We wanted to come up with a way to show our appreciation for agriculture educators at the start of the school year and share some positivity and words of encouragement for all they do to mentor, inspire and support their students,” said Michelle Shearer, Workforce Development Manager at the Dairy Excellence Foundation. “We are amazed at the generosity and support from both our sponsors and the individuals across the agriculture and dairy industries who helped us send more than 250 boxes to kick off the school year.”

The back-to-school boxes included office supplies, gift cards, stress “cows,” candy, and personal messages from the individuals and businesses that donated to send boxes to educators. Many dairy producers sent boxes to agriculture educators in a nearby district, thanking them for their work and encouraging them to reach out if they want to tour or connect with a working dairy farm. Many parents and neighbors sent boxes to their adult children or friends who are ag educators to share positivity at the start of the school year.

Several businesses and organizations participated by making a donation and asking the Dairy Leaders of Tomorrow team to choose teachers in their county to receive boxes as a way to express their appreciation.

One of the major initiatives for the Lancaster County Ag Council is ag education, especially educating our youth. With that in mind, the ag educators in Lancaster County play a very important role in the agricultural education process of Lancaster County youth,” said Greg Kirkham, Executive Director of the Lancaster County Agriculture Council, one of the sponsors for the boxes. “The teachers were very appreciative of the thoughtfulness of all involved in providing this recognition to them. I have heard from many who expressed how opening the box eased some anxiety when preparing for the new school year, not to mention the practicality of several items enclosed in the box. Lancaster County Agriculture Council is happy to participate in this program.”

In addition to the Lancaster County Agriculture Council, sponsors for the back-to-school boxes included Allied Milk Producers, American Dairy Association North East, Berks County Department of Agriculture, Herbein + Company, King Construction, New Holland Agriculture, Penn State Extension, Pennian Bank,

Pennsylvania FFA Foundation, Pennsylvania Friends of Farm Show Foundation, Inc., Petersheim's Cow, Mattresses LLC, Reinford Farms, Versant Strategies, and more than 200 individuals who made a donation to send boxes to educators in their community. “Thank you so much for the box of goodies and sweet note. It means more than words can say and was such a kind surprise. The program and I are so blessed to have people like you in our community,” shared Carissa Clevon, an agriculture educator from Wisconsin who received a box.

All proceeds from the campaign benefitted agriculture educators and the Dairy Excellence Foundation, which manages the Dairy Leaders of Tomorrow program. The DLT curriculum is available at no cost to high school educators thanks to support from sponsors and donors. The DLT program includes four main courses: Introduction to Dairy, Introduction to Dairy Herd Management, Introduction to Dairy Business Management, and Introduction to Dairy Technologies. Teachers can incorporate these courses into their classroom instruction or assign to high school students to complete independently.

DLT lesson plans and associated resources can be accessed online and downloaded at no cost once educators or students complete the DLT registration. Scholarship opportunities and on-farm learning experiences are also available to teachers and students who are enrolled in the program.
