#### "Stitching Freedom: A Traveling Quilt Honors Pennsylvania's Role in Independence"

"Every stitch tells a story — and every stop reminds us we're all part of Growing a Nation."

Traveling through Pennsylvania's patchwork of farms, fairs, and hometown festivals, the Friends of the Pennsylvania Farm Show Foundation's America250PA Quilt has been doing more than turning heads — it's been turning neighbors into friends and memories into connections.

Over the past year, this special quilt has made its way to 12 county and community fairs across the Commonwealth, conventions, and organizational events bringing a piece of Farm Show spirit everywhere it goes.

It's also been a fundraising effort for the Friends of the Pennsylvania Farm Show Foundation, with volunteers selling raffle tickets for a chance to win this historic work of art. The drawing will take place on January 17, 2026—the final day of the Pennsylvania Farm Show. So far, the effort has raised over \$5,500 toward a \$10,000 goal, with every dollar supporting youth ag education and the PA Farm Show Scholarship Foundation program that helps grow the next generation of Pennsylvania agriculture.

Created through a partnership between Cumberland Valley Grange, Scrubgrass Grange, and the Friends of the Pennsylvania Farm Show Foundation, the quilt includes nine blocks honoring the Pennsylvania men who signed the Declaration of Independence, surrounded by additional designs that celebrate our Commonwealth's agricultural heritage and community spirit. One of its most remarkable features is that more than 600, 2025 Farm Show visitors, helped hand-quilt it, making the project a true labor of love — and a symbol of how Pennsylvanians come together to

#### Growing a Nation: Pennsylvania Agriculture Leads the Way

At the historic Wyck House Farm and Garden in Philadelphia — one of America's oldest continuously cultivated farms — Pennsylvania Agriculture Secretary Russell Redding announced the theme for the 2026 Pennsylvania Farm Show: "Growing a Nation."

The setting couldn't have been more fitting. For over 300 years, Wyck's soil has nourished generations, much like Pennsylvania agriculture has sustained our nation for 250 years. "America was born in Pennsylvania, with its identity deeply rooted in agriculture," Redding said. "Two hundred and fifty years later, Pennsylvania agriculture is still leading our nation — growing its future through innovation, hard work, and community."

That same spirit fills the Farm Show each January — a celebration of farming families, food traditions, and the people who make agriculture thrive. Pennsylvania's agriculture and food industry now supports 600,000 jobs and contributes \$132 billion annually to the state's economy, keeping our communities strong and our plates full.

Wyck Executive Director Kim Staub reflected on how the past continues to inspire today's growers, "We use the past as inspiration for the present — sharing a harvest that puts food on the table and strengthens connections in our urban neighborhood."

The announcement also ties into the America250PA celebration, marking 250 years of American independence and Pennsylvania's pivotal role in it. From the signing of the Declaration of Independence to today's modern farms, Pennsylvania continues to be a cornerstone of the nation's growth and progress.

HARRISBURG, Pa. – The Keystone International Livestock Exposition (KILE) was held at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex in Harrisburg from Sept. 25 through Oct. 5. Exhibitors from 22 states participated in the largest livestock show on the East Coast. With more than 5,000 entries, there was no shortage of talent, dedication, and hard work on display.

The Farm Show Complex hosted over 1,500 exhibitors showing goats, swine, ranch and draft horses, cattle, sheep, and wool. Vendors welcomed attendees to the Stockman's Trade Show, while 30 barbecue teams and 16 steak cook-off chefs filled the Cameron Street parking lot with the mouthwatering aroma of their best recipes. Across the complex, over 60 judges evaluated the competitors in each arena, recognizing excellence across every species and division.

#### Sebright Honored for Leadership in Pennsylvania's Dairy Industry





#### DAIRY HALL OF FAME AWARD

This award was developed to recognize the outstanding service and accomplishments of Pennsylvania dairy leaders. Selection is based on character, leadership, and the development of youth in the dairy industry.

2025 Recipient: Jayne Sebright

PA Department of Agriculture Deputy Secretary Lisa Graybeal with 2025 Dairy Hall of Fame Award recipient Jayne Sebright at the All-America Dairy Show & Premier National Junior Events show at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex and Expo Center in Harrisburg.

Jayne Sebright, Executive Director of the Center for Dairy Excellence and the Dairy Excellence Foundation, was recognized for her outstanding leadership and lifelong dedication to the dairy community with induction into the Dairy Hall of Fame. The honor was presented during the Premier National Junior Show Supreme Pageant on September 15, at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex and Expo Center.

As executive director, Sebright oversees both the Center for Dairy Excellence, a public-private 501(c)(6) organization that supports Pennsylvania's dairy industry, and the Dairy Excellence Foundation, a charitable 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to cultivating the next generation of dairy producers, advocates, and consumers nationwide.

Under her direction, a team of eight creative and passionate professionals provides programming and resources that strengthen individual dairy farms and related

and resources that strengthen individual dairy farms and related businesses across the Commonwealth. The Foundation's education and outreach efforts now reach more than 2 million students annually, engaging 43,000 educators through the Adopt A Cow program, and inspiring more than 34,000 students through Dairy Leaders of Tomorrow. Each year, over \$70,000 in scholarships and on-farm internships are awarded in partnership with the dairy industry to support aspiring agricultural professionals.

Sebright joined the Center for Dairy Excellence in 2006 and has served as its director since 2016. A 1995 Penn State graduate, she earned her bachelor's degree in agricultural science with highest distinction. Her career has also included roles with Land O'Lakes, Lancaster Farming, and the Mid-Atlantic Dairy Association (now part of the American Dairy Association Northeast).

Beyond her professional achievements, Sebright and her husband, Robby, operate a dairy and crop farm in East Berlin. They are the proud parents of three grown sons — George and his wife, Brooke; Charlie; and Eddie.

Sebright's induction into the Dairy Hall of Fame highlights her enduring impact on Pennsylvania's agricultural community and her commitment to ensuring a vibrant future for the dairy industry.

#### First Time Farm Show Exhibitors- START HERE!

Exhibiting at the Pennsylvania
Farm Show can seem daunting
your first time — but with the right
preparation and knowledge of the
rules, you can avoid surprises and
make the most of your experience.
Below are commonly asked
questions drawn from our FAQ
page on the Farm Show website,
along with guidance to help you
navigate your first year. For the

#### 1. How do I enter the Farm Show?

All entries must be made online, unless an exception is stated in your department's rules.
Use the "Registration" link associated with your department (e.g. Livestock, Commodities, Family Living) via the Premium List pages.

After entering your information, be sure to hit submit — entries not submitted won't count.

The final step is payment, which must be made online. No checks or cash will be accepted. Entries without completed payment by the deadline will be considered incomplete.

#### 2. What are the youth/4-H/FFA rules?

Youth exhibitors must be active members of 4-H or FFA, typically born between the specified years (for example, 2006–2016, as referenced in the FAQ) and carrying a supervised project. Youth must show their own animals in youth classes. If that's not possible, another youth exhibitor may show it in the youth division.

In many cases, youth entries are also required to compete in the open show (i.e., not limited to just youth competitions).

There are open youth classes in

### 3. What are the registration timing, deadlines, and cancellation rules?

Entry deadlines vary by department—always check your department's rules and the first pages of the rule book for specific dates.



Late entries are not accepted.

If an entry is canceled on or before a given cutoff date, there is no penalty, but entry fees are not refunded.

Cancellations after the cutoff incur a \$100 penalty per animal.

#### 4. Livestock exhibitor? Here are some common issues.

Ownership and registration rules: Typically, the exhibitor and the owner listed on the entry must be the same person. If you lease an animal, list yourself as the owner and submit the appropriate lease paperwork at check-in.

Animals must be properly registered with their breed organization; if you lack the required paperwork or identification, the animal may be disqualified at check-in.

Substitutions are allowed within the same breed (i.e., you cannot switch to a different breed). If an entry is scratched (withdrawn), it cannot be reentered with the same animal or a different animal.

Use the class birthdate and eligibility rules listed in your department's rules to determine the correct class.

You can place a stalling request (which pen or with which exhibitor you prefer), but note it is only a request—not guaranteed.

If your item doesn't clearly match a class, it may be reassigned upon arrival or may not be accepted.

A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) must be dated within 30 days of the show for most species.

For many animals, rabies vaccination is mandatory or highly recommended if age 3 months old or older (for breeding and market classes).

All animals must be identified onsite with an 840 ISO-compliant 15-digit ear tag, a USDA metal tag, or an approved implant. The CVI must include that tag or identification.

For youth exhibitors showing livestock, the YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) certification is required in many junior market classes. Do not wait until the last minute.

For specialized species (e.g., poultry, turkeys), additional health, identification, or technician requirements may apply.

Initial bedding is provided.
Additional bedding and feed can be purchased through the "Feed Room" on-site.

Trailers are allowed for unloading/loading, but are otherwise parked in designated lots

Camping on site is generally discouraged and is available only on a first-come, first-served basis (reservations are not accepted ahead of time).

Exhibitors generally receive one parking pass (livestock); additional passes can often be purchased with your entries or via the Farm Show Admin Office.

Junior Market animals are all sold through the Junior Market Sale on Tuesday. Eligible youth market animals are as follows: market cattle, market lamb, market swine, market goats, market turkeys, and meat rabbits.

#### 5. I want to enter a commodity or a family living item.

Almost all classes need to be preregistered to enter. Entry fee for Family Living and most commodities is \$1.00 up until December 15 and then \$2.00 from December 16 to the entry deadline of January 7, 2026.

Very few classes (e.g., Special Food Contests) require you to bring the item to a designated location at a scheduled time with no preregistration beyond prior qualification at local fairs. This would include Homemade Chocolate Cake, Blue Ribbon Apple Pie Contest, PA Preferred Junior Baking Cookies/Brownies/Bars, and Incredible Angel Food Cake Contest.

Some departments limit the number of entries per exhibitor or per class—check your department's rules.
For Family Living and other display-based departments, submit only one entry per class, adhere to size requirements, and ensure appropriate packaging/shipping. Refer to each department's rules first before you enter.

### 6. How and when do I pick up my entries or exhibits (Family Living/Commodities)?

In most cases, items will need to be picked up after 5:00 p.m. on the last day of the Farm Show.

Alternatively, they may be claimed within 15 days after the show (check the show office for details).

Double-check that you have all your items before leaving; errors sometimes occur in sorting or packing.

#### 7. What additional advice for first-time exhibitors?

Read everything carefully. Start with the "General Rules & Regulations" and "Code of Ethics," and then move into department rules you would like to enter.

Gather all necessary documentation well ahead of time (registration data, health certificates, identification tags, youth certifications).

Pay close attention to deadlines—entry, cancellation, arrival, show, etc

Be proactive in asking questions! Farm Show staff are available to help. Don't hesitate to call or email. For youth, don't postpone obtaining required certifications like YQCA.

Use stalling requests, but don't count on them being fulfilled exactly.

During delivery and teardown, follow instructions about where trailers are parked and when vehicles may enter the complex grounds.

Keep records (which classes you entered, records needed, weights, tags) so next year's planning is easier.
